Friday, July 18- Historical Day

- Visit the homesteads and cemeteries of the Soash families who settled in the area
- Visit to Grand Rapids, a restored historical town along the Maumee River, incorporated in 1803. Attractions include the local shops, Ludwig Mill powered by a water wheel, a mule powered canal trip, and the *Bluebird*, the train that follows the river for a scenic trip.
- Dinner at the American Legion near Grand Rapids.

- Visits to some of these area attractions:
 - Fort Meigs, a reconstructed fort for the defense of the Maumee Valley
 - Science and Technology Center of Toledo

 - Rutherford B. Hayes home and library
 - Wood County Historical Museum

The Maumee Valley

The Maumee is the largest river emptying into the Great Lakes. Settlements along the river were established by the late 1700's. The area that now comprises much of Wood, Ottawa and Sandusky Counties comprised the **Black Swamp**, one of lowest, most unpleasant places that early settlers encountered. German and Dutch farmers developed a system of drainage ditches and established the use of clay field tile to drain the excess water and convert the land to farming.
